Jonathan Morrow, M.D., Ph.D. received his B.S. in Biological Sciences from the University of Southern California, and his M.D. and Ph.D. in Neuroscience from the University of Michigan. Dr. Morrow went on to complete his residency training in Adult Psychiatry at the University of Michigan, and subsequently joined the faculty of the University of Michigan as an Assistant Professor of in 2011. He provides medication management and other clinical care to patients through the University of Michigan Addiction Treatment Services. His clinical interests include treatment of co-occurring psychiatric disorders such as addiction and post-traumatic stress disorder

(PTSD). The Morrow lab uses behavioral, pharmacological, immunohistochemical, and neurosurgical techniques to identify and manipulate specific neural circuits that show individual differences relevant to multiple psychiatric disorders, including both addiction and PTSD.
